
A unique combination - a storybook and textbook for professionals by professionals

This is a book about running agents, human sources, CHIS (Covert Human Intelligence Sources) and informers. It is written by two British authors who have considerable experience in fieldwork and training agencies around the world. It offers a British perspective on the subject while recognising each agency will run their operations differently.

The basic skills, however, remain the same:
